I look forward to continuing to work with the Board, faculty, and administration to continue our combined efforts in educating our children and ensuring the future of our community and its institutions.

Creativity in the Bet Hayeled Classrooms

When you walk into a Bet Hayeled classroom, one of the first few things you notice are students building on the carpet and engaging in dramatic play. You may look around and see other students reading in the book nook, or exploring a centre at one of the tables. You may even stop and think to yourself: "Wow - this room is upside down!" This, however, is exactly what a Bet Hayeled educator wants to see in their classroom. The "mess" which you see is part of youngsters expressing their creativity; they are using a range of learning techniques, such as kinesthetic, visual, auditory and tactile learning, and are developing their creative minds.

At AHS, one of our favourite ways for the students to explore their creativity is by using Design Theory and the Maker Mindset. Design Theory shifts the focus to the students' curiosity, and encourages them to be the leaders

of their learning. The Makerspaces in our Bet Hayeled classrooms are dedicated areas in the classroom full of recyclable materials, scraps, markers, glue, tape, boxes, etc., and they are open freely for the students to venture into throughout their day.

These spaces are intentionally designed to encompass the Design Theory of thinking and accommodate all types of learners. For example, our students were tasked to create a home for animals to live in during the winter, which had to be sturdy and weather-resistant. In the Makerspace, the students made use of the open space to demonstrate Design Theory thinking as they created their animal homes, tested their creations, added to them and re-iterated until they were satisfied with their animal homes.

The next time you are visiting AHS, see if you have the chance to pop your head into some Bet Hayeled classrooms and check out the creative minds at work and play!

Remembering where we come from helps guide us on our journey and figure out where we want to go. By inviting Grandparents, close family members, and mentors to participate in programs with our students, we create special moments and elevate the learning for everyone.

Students in Bet Hayeled shared a Shabbat experience together with their Grandpals. They said Brachot over candles, grape juice, and challah, and sang Shabbat songs together. Students and their Grandpals also worked together to create art projects related to Shabbat, such as making candlesticks, decorating placemats, and creating flowers and vases for a Shabbat table. Watching Shabbat traditions get passed down from one generation to another makes it meaningful.

Middle School students invited their Grandpals to experience a "Day in the life of a Danilack student." The day started off with a workshop on memory and connection, in which Grandpals reminisced about significant life events and shared stories that shaped their lives. Everyone participated in a ruach-filled Tefillah B'Yachad, and the Grandpals joined the students in their daily classes.



Yaad Destination: Judaism



What should an Associated graduate know about Judaism?

Should they know what signs make an animal kosher? The Hebrew dates of all Jewish holidays? The history of Medinat Yisrael?

The answer, of course, is "all of the above" - and more.

This year, we implemented a curriculum companion called "Yaad." The Hebrew word "Yaad" means "destination," referring to the journey that we are all travelling on throughout our learning; "Yaad" is also an acronym for "Yahadut, Arachim, Demokratia" - "Judaism, values, democracy." These three important principles are part of our mission statement at Associated, and are embedded throughout our Judaic Studies and General Studies curriculum.

Compiled and edited by our Director of Operations, **Becky Friedman '07,** and made possible by a generous donation from the **Mansell family**, the "Yaad" curriculum companion is used across grades to focus on different aspects of Jewish life. Each section ranges from basic to more complex - from the days of the week to the contents of each tractate of Mishna. There is something for everyone. This cross-grade and multi-subject approach teaches students an additional lesson: that taking an active role in one's Judaism is relevant in every class, and is supported by every AHS teacher.

Associated with a Love of Learning:

The Rush-Gordon Family

Although they grew up not far from one another, **Dr. Raffi Rush** (himself a former AHS student) and **Dr. Lauren Gordon** didn't meet until university. Now both working as doctors - Raffi as a rheumatologist and general internist in the Toronto area, and Lauren as a vascular surgery resident at the University of Toronto - they send their two children, **Gabriel** and **Noa Rush-Gordon**, to the Bet Hayeled at Associated's Posluns campus.

Many friends, neighbours, and relatives recommended AHS as the right place for their family. They felt like they had found where their family belonged when they moved Gabriel to Associated for JK, and had no hesitation sending his younger sister to AHS for Nursery this year.

Gabriel quickly transitioned into his new classroom and became fast friends with many of his classmates. His JK teachers taught him to read and write, helped him learn basic geometry, and encouraged his individual passions. When he grew interested in geography, his teachers helped him learn to draw a new flag every day.

Gabriel's Jewish learning skyrocketed during chalav u'dvash, the time set aside for Hebrew learning each day. He came home excited to share what he had learned about tzedakah, Tefillah, and the weekly Torah portion. Each year before Pesach, our JK students perform in a model Seder to which parents are invited. Raffi's and Lauren's hearts were warmed by Gabriel's Seder last April. "I came for the model Seder," Raffi recalls, "and I was almost in tears! I couldn't be happier with all the middot Gabriel's developed and what he's learned."

Gabriel's enthusiasm for school was infectious, and his little sister Noa couldn't wait to follow him to Associated. Raffi and Lauren were thrilled to see her first impressions of the school at the Bet Hayeled Meet'n'Greet. Lauren admits she'd been worried about her daughter being overlooked in the bustle of her first time in a classroom, but those worries were quickly forgotten: "She helped the teacher corral all the other children into a circle," Lauren laughs. "And she's already found most of the elephants [Noa's favourite animal] in the room."



"Noa got very upset about school as I was putting her to bed," Raffi recalls about Noa's first day of school. "I was very confused. Then she clarified: 'I don't want half day! I want whole day!"

Raffi and Lauren are thrilled with every aspect of their children's and family's AHS experience, from the way the kids on the bus look out for each other, to all the staff, whose care for their children is deeply felt, and the learning that their children bring home every day. "Gabriel taught Noa brachot," Raffi says, glowing with pride. "And his Hebrew accent is way better than mine."

It's not just the parents who feel they've found a second home at Associated: Gabriel couldn't wait to get back to school after a summer at camp. Recently, Gabriel and Noa told their parents that when they grow up, they want to be surgeons who teach at Posluns together.

They're looking forward to Noa getting that full-day experience next year in JK, and to both children continuing to flourish and to grow by leaps and bounds at Associated, along with their close friends. "We feel privileged to have them at AHS."



Pathway to Posluns

With a focus in special education, Cindy's career began as a primary teacher. She supported students and staff as a Reading Recovery Teacher and Literacy Coordinator - but it was Cindy's position of Behavioral Regional Support Resource that led her to realize her passion for educational administration. She went on to serve as a Principal across four TDSB schools, each in a different community and with varying needs and challenges. Connecting to our Jewish Heritage

AHS students participate in a wide variety of programming to enhance what they are learning in class and use it in a real-world context.

During the Aseret Yemei Teshuvah, Kamin Grade 3 students learned about the origins of Tashlich and the symbolism behind it, and about the process of asking for forgiveness. They then had the experience of walking to the JCC and completing the Tashlich ritual as a class. In the weeks leading up to Sukkot, our AHS students learned about the process of building a sukkah, and then made cross-curricular connections between the laws of Sukkot and Math to build a scale model of a sukkah using only recycled materials. Embedded in these learning activities were the Jewish principles of Tikun Olam and preserving nature.

The Grade 1 Tekes Aliyah is another wonderful example of a communal activity that connects students to their families, to Israel, and to other students at their campus. At each our Posluns and Kamin Elementary branches, each Grade 1 student is paired up with a Grade 5 buddy who supports them as they leave Bet Hayeled and enter grade school.

Lucas and Nazeem, two Grade 5 students, shared about the value that the Grade 5 students see in participating in this way in the Tekes Aliyah. "It's to welcome the Grade 1 students. We're receiving them."

Noya Zaltzman, an AHS staff member who takes a leadership role in coordinating some of our experiential learning activities, knows the impact that these programs have. "Students have the opportunity to practice the dinim and minhagim that they learn about in class. These are hands-on experiences for students. They learn things in the classroom in theory, and this brings it to life."


We Are Associated with Israel

Reach Ahead: New High School Credit Course at Danilack Middle School

Engagement is a cornerstone of effective learning. Starting in Grade 7, our students exercise voice and choice in their learning by selecting two interest-based semestered courses. This initiative significantly reduces risk of academic disinterest, ultimately leading to improved performance and a deeper passion for learning. This year, our Grade 8 had the opportunity to choose to take a Grade 9 Geography credit course. By empowering our students to take charge of their education, we prepare them to be proactive learners, and we continue to set AHS apart from other day schools.

At Associated, education is a journey without rigid boundaries. As the world evolves, so does our approach to learning. Offering Grade 8 students the opportunity to take a Grade 9 Geography credit will yield a multitude of benefits. Beyond providing knowledge, this initiative nurtures intellectual growth, fosters responsibility, and equips students with essential skills that will serve them well in the future. This course continues our tradition of exposing students to a high level of academic rigour. By navigating more demanding coursework at an earlier stage, students develop resilience, time management skills, and study habits that will undoubtedly contribute to their success in their future academic pursuits.



Transitioning from Middle School to high school can be daunting. This course is another step AHS provides for ensuring a smooth transition to the more demanding academic environment of high school. Grade 9 Reach Ahead Geography, taught by AHS educator Mr. Rafael Brusilow, introduces students to a range of skills that extend beyond the classroom. Through research projects, map analyses, and critical examinations of global issues, students cultivate skills such as information gathering, data analysis, effective communication, and teamwork. Providing opportunities like this one represents our commitment to nurturing the full potential of every student.

For the Love of Torah

Each year on Shavuot, and again on Simchat Torah, we renew our commitment as a people to the acceptance, love, and study of Torah. At AHS, we take this commitment very seriously: we offer a rigorous and enriching Tanach program, which includes learning about the Parsha as early as Bet Hayeled and introduces text-based Torah learning from Grade 2 and up, and we incorporate the lessons and values of Torah into everything we do as a school. In addition, we offer our students the opportunity to set aside additional time for studying Torah for its own sake, through the Chidon HaTanach, the National Bible Contest.

This special endeavour is offered to students in Grades 5-8. They are so excited to be given this opportunity - in fact, many years, even after the contest has concluded in May, the students ask to continue meeting after school each week, to enhance their Torah learning.

In the Grade 5/6 and Grade 7/8 divisions, respectively, the students study the assigned chapters together after school each week - the Grade 7 and 8 students as one class (studying with **Rabbi Saar Rogen**), and the Grade 5 and 6 students from Kamin, Posluns, and Danilack all coming together as the other. Their months of reviewing, practicing, sharing insights on the material and writing up lists and notes stand them in good stead at the Regional Contest in early March, a multiple-choice test that will determine who goes on to the Nationals in May.

On May 7, 2023, thirteen AHS students made their way to Montreal for the National Bible Contest - some drove, some flew, some boarded the official Chidon bus in the morning, all with a great sense of excitement. Upon arrival in Montreal, we were greeted by our Montreal counterparts and students from across Canada who share our love of Torah. After a warm welcome from the contest organizers, students wrote the first part of the contest before retiring to a pizza dinner and their respective lodgings.

A big day was in store for them the next morning: throughout Monday, May 8, students wrote the Round 1, Semi-Finals, and Finals tests, interspersed with activities ranging from Bingo, art, and sports to a Tanach-themed interactive skit and trivia game.

AHS students Maya Vidal '23, Joshua Burton and Jessica Silverman (Grades 7/8 Division), and Mara Green, Yair Sharon, and Misha Vishnever (Grades 5/6 Division) ranked in the Semi-Finals (top 10), and Jessica Silverman placed in the Finals (top 5).

But AHS's love of Torah doesn't end at Graduation; many AHS alumni continue to participate in the Chidon HaTanach in high school - including, most recently, **Eliyahu Oziel '19**, who represented Canada last Spring at the International Bible Contest in Israel, ranking in the top 6 of the Diaspora Contest, and **Aviv Sharon '21**, who placed second in Canada ("Sgan HaTanach") at the Nationals last May, and will be representing Canada in the Internationals in Israel on Yom Ha'atzmaut, 2024.

We are also thrilled to continue seeing familiar faces at the Nationals, as AHS alumni who have won the Chidon in the past frequently return as coaches and judges

This year, that meant seeing Ryan Ripsman '13 as another school's coach, and our Director of Operations Becky Friedman '07 continuing to coach AHS's Grade 5/6 team. In past years, we have been proud to see other AHS alumni Chidon winners as coaches, judges and proctors, including Elisheva Brauner '04, Sofia Freudenstein '12, Ori Epstein '17, and Yoav Gudes '18 - and, of course, we are deeply grateful to the tireless efforts of AHS Alumna Tanya Werger '06, Project Manager at the UJA Federation of Greater Toronto, who continues to serve as one of the lead organizers of the Canadian Chidon HaTanach.

This year, our Chidon HaTanach students are beginning to study the book of Shemot (Exodus) in Grades 5 and 6, along with the books of Shoftim (Judges) and Melachim Aleph (Kings I) in Grades 7 and 8, in preparation for the Regionals in March and the Nationals in May. **Team AHS has a bright year of Torah study and accomplishment ahead of them!**

The Empathy Effect

"Stepping into someone else's shoes can move a person to action."

Kim Smiley


As a business leader, non-profit founder, and proud AHS parent, **Kim Smiley** leads by example in making the world a kinder place. Kim is a Harvard graduate with training in religion and philosophy. She is also a talented artist who uses her creations to support philanthropic endeavours. Kim has worked in the non-profit sector for 13 years, including Habitat for Humanity, the UJA Federation, and Montreal's Holocaust Museum. We sat down with Kim to learn more about an initiative of hers that is taking the world by storm: The Empathy Effect.

The Empathy Effect

The Empathy Effect started as a social experiment on Facebook. Kim challenged herself to post one black-and-white image to invoke empathy, every day for a year, with the exception of Shabbat. After only 5 days, it went viral.

The Empathy Pledge

On the last day of Kim's Empathy Effect challenge, she launched the Empathy Pledge, a promise that individuals could make to practice one act of empathy each day. "It's the difference between 'slacktivism' and 'activism," Kim explained. "You've engaged online. Now you're engaging in person." Individuals can purchase an Empathy Pin, to symbolize their commitment to the Empathy Pledge. The Jewish values of tzedakah and tikun olam are embedded in every business decision that Kim makes: proceeds from the pin go to a non-profit charity that Kim founded, supporting impoverished families in Toronto's Jewish community, as well as new Canadian refugees.





The Empathy Game

Kim's next step was to expand her reach. "My goal is to educate one million people in empathy over the next year." She created The Empathy Game, for players of all ages to cultivate deep listening and strengthen their empathy.

Kim took a huge risk - beta-testing The Empathy Game in a room full of 400 children. With a group ranging in age from four-year-olds to Grade 8, the energy was palpable. "The child pretending to be a koala bear became the koala bear," Kim says, describing how child after child stepped into the shoes of a character in a story. "I knew, in that moment, that I had something really incredible."

The Empathy Empire

Kim believes passionately that lack of funds should not be a barrier to access. For every copy of the game that she sells, she donates one to local educational institutions, and to educational organizations in India and Africa. "I'm trying to create connection, because I feel like the disconnect is higher than ever. There's a warmth that has evaporated from society. We need retraining. Now, more than ever, it's extremely salient."

What's next for the Empathy Empire? Kim is looking to expand her team to reach even more people.

"I'll be connecting with doctors, lawyers, the police department. People in the prison system. I want this to be global. I want it everywhere."

Raising Makers and Mentsches

This year, one of our strategic focuses is promoting empathy. **Dr. Lee-Ron Kaye**, Head of School, reached out to Kim about running a professional development session for our teachers in August, as part of our ongoing efforts to promote empathy, strengthen our community, and instill positive middot in our students. Kim spoke about self-compassion as a prerequisite for compassion towards others. "Empathy begins with oneself. You cannot truly practice empathy towards others if you do not practice empathy with yourself." Staff members reflected and brainstormed ideas for bringing empathy into their classrooms, and left the Kim's interactive program feeling inspired and invigorated for the year ahead.

The appreciation was mutual. "Speaking at the PD day in September was a gift for me," Kim shared. "Being in a room with people who care so much about children was wonderful." Kim is looking forward to her continued partnership with Associated. AHS will be purchasing a copy of The Empathy Game and incorporating it into our repertoire of classroom resources. Along with skills in digital literacy, collaboration, problem-solving, and creativity, empathy is another tool we are equipping our students with in their 21st-Century toolkit.

Proud to be an AHS Parent

Growing up in Montreal, Kim attended a Jewish supplementary school. After moving to Toronto and making the decision to send her children to a Jewish day school, Kim checked out many different schools to find the right fit for their family. Before she had even completed her tour of the Posluns campus, her decision had been made. "This is the place. This is the energy."

"The heimishe environment is exactly what I wanted for my kids," Kim expressed. "You feel it in every classroom." Kim is the proud parent of two AHS students, **Sam** and **Maya**. They are thriving in their Grade 2 and SK classes, and Kim attributes this to their sense of belonging. "We made the choice to send our kids to Associated because it felt right in my neshama when I came in the door and when we came on our tour. It felt like this was where we belonged. And that feeling has only been reinforced since my kids have been here."

Empathy is Kim's raison d'etre. "I believe every person has a reason that they're here. For me, this was my reason." At Associated, empathy aligns deeply with our core values of inclusion and building community. We are proud to be associated with this powerful endeavour.



Continuing to Learn with Our Alumni: Rabbi Dr. Martin Lockshin '64

AHS was privileged to host **Rabbi Dr. Marty Lockshin '64,** for a Lunch & Learn for our Danilack Judaic Studies staff on Tuesday, October 31.

While he now lives in Israel with his wife, we are proud that Rabbi Lockshin is not only an AHS alumnus, but is also the son of **Louis Lockshin 3"l**, a life member of AHS's Board of Directors, who played an integral role in building the Finch branch (now the Hurwich Education Centre) of Associated. Before the Lunch & Learn, we were thrilled to have the opportunity to sit down with Rabbi Lockshin for a brief Q&A.



AHS: What are some of your earliest memories at AHS?

ML: I remember when this building (the Hurwich Education Centre) was being built. My father liked to work with his hands, so we went walking through the construction site together. He told me that this was going to be such a good thing for Jewish education. He really believed in this school, and so do I. It's a very nice feeling, coming back to the school where I learned so much and where many people whom I taught are now working.

I transferred to AHS from another Jewish Day School for Grade 3, and one of my earliest memories is that I didn't understand what was going on in class, because my previous school had not taught us Ivrit b'Ivrit. We learned a tonne at AHS - we were able to speak Hebrew, and read Biblical texts in the original, and the secular studies were good, too.

I had a lifelong relationship with my 5th-grade Hebrew teacher, **Rabbi Yehuda Weiss**. He was a brilliant educator and a Talmid Chacham. When my wife and I married, he sponsored one of the Sheva Brachot in our honour at AHS! When I was at AHS, the Hebrew Principal was **Dr. Levi Jacober**. He was a great Zionist, and a great scholar of Judaism, though he had never been to Israel. Years later, when I was studying in Yeshiva, I saw him on his first trip to Israel - his face was shining, and his eyes were bright with his love of Israel.

There weren't very many Jewish Day Schools in Toronto at that point, and a relatively small percentage of young Jewish people in Toronto were getting a day school education - there is a much higher percentage now - but there was a sense that AHS was training the best and the brightest. It was exciting for me, learning together with a lot of very bright young people my age.





AHS: What led to you making Aliyah?

ML: The education that I received here at AHS taught me that Israel is where Jewish culture and Jewish life can thrive. These things were important to me.

AHS: Where do you live now? What makes the area special for you?

ML: I live in Jerusalem, in Katamon. My wife and I have lived in many different parts of Jerusalem, and we have been happy in every one.

Our neighbourhood is an interesting place to live because it includes people from different socio-economic groups. On Simchat Torah this year, we went to an early minyan, and shul was almost over by the time the sirens started. We took the longer route home, to stay near buildings in case of another siren. There was a siren as we walked, so we entered an apartment building which happened to be not very well-off. One of the residents saw us sheltering in the stairwell and invited us in, offering us water. Even with all the terrible things going on, this is just a small example of the beautiful spirit of helping one another, being one people, that we have seen over the last few weeks.

AHS: We are so proud to have alumni like you who are so anchored in Jewish values. What would be your message to our AHS grads?

ML: When I graduated high school, I had this feeling, which I abandoned very quickly, that I had studied religious matters enough; I wanted to study Tanach, but not in a religious framework. About halfway through the year, studying Tanach at the Hebrew University, I realized that I felt disappointed, for the first time, in my studies, because of the distance from the text compared to how at AHS we would grapple with the text as Jews - I was missing the Jewish values that were present here.

AHS: We want our graduates to be anchored in both the Jewish and the general world, and you truly exemplify that. What words of advice do you have for those who pursue a path like yours?

ML: In elementary school, we are in Judaic Studies for half the day, and General Studies for half the day - one thing that we learn from this is that both of these things are important, and when we leave, we want to try to keep both of them up. My graduating class from Associated got into some of the best universities, and some went on to higher Jewish education. I think it's a very positive development that more people have realized that Judaism isn't just what we can learn in elementary school or high school.



Remembering Arthur Kruger z"l

Or. Arthur Kruger 3"L, beloved husband of Betty Kruger, son-in-law of AHS founder Dr. Levi Jacober 3"L, and father of Sarah Sherman '75, Nina Bernstein '78, Yacov Kruger '81 and Naomi Arram '83, was a Life Member of AHS and a member of the AHS Board of Governors, having been a Past Vice-President of the Board of Directors and Chair of the standing committee of Scholarship & Endowment. His passion for the school was driven by his appreciation for the unique Ivrit B'Ivrit curriculum provided by AHS for our diverse community of students. He would always say that without the immersive Ivrit curriculum provided by AHS, one cannot fully appreciate the nuance, depth and richness of the Torah, Talmud, Jewish traditions, and Biblical commentary that are intertwined with the Hebrew language. Arthur 3"L was able to live the dream of settling in Yerushalayim. He valued AHS for integrating the beauty and vibrancy of modern Israeli society into the classroom.



Alumni Helping at Home and Abroad

Since childhood, Associated alumni **Devy and Aden Gilbert** have been using their passions and talents to make a difference in the lives of others. We sat down with this incredible sibling duo to hear about their volunteer initiatives, and how their time at Associated inspired them to get involved in community activism.

Programs at Associated inspired both Devy and Aden to find their own ways of helping the community - both at home and abroad. "A big inspiration for me was my Grade 4 Project Give-Back assignment," explains Aden. "The presentations given by my peers inspired me and exposed me to countless volunteer causes that I was unaware of." Aden chose to present about the Devy Herlin Memorial Fund at the Montreal Jewish General Hospital - a foundation for cardiac care in honour of his grandfather. Devy, who is named after her brother's project's namesake, also found a way to honour her late grandfather's memory with her Project Give-Back assignment at Associated, through a project on the Heart and Stroke Foundation.

What began as an elementary school project turned into a lifelong passion for Devy. Now in her third year at Queens University, she volunteers at the Heart and Stroke Foundation as a co-chair, liaising between the foundation and her university to coordinate fundraising initiatives. Devy is the vice-president of Delta Pi, a Jewish sorority that has a strong involvement in raising money for charitable causes. She is also planning her third trip to Tanzania, where she practices midwifery at a birthing centre, supports individuals living with HIV, works with women and children in a halfway house, and helps out at a local school. "The people I have connected to are the kindest, most generous people I have ever met," Devy says.

"It's great that we as Canadians are learning and gaining awareness for other countries' needs. But actually immersing oneself into their society is an eye-opener. For women in Tanzania, life can be very challenging."

Aden is in his second year, also at Queens, studying Engineering. He shares that the dual curriculum at Associated helped prepare him for the volume of work in university. "I learned to balance the workload volume of both an English and Hebrew curriculum. This most definitely helped prepare me for my university studies."



Siblings, AHS Alumni, and volunteers extraordinaires Devy and Aden Gilbert

Last summer, Aden volunteered at a coral reef conservation in Indonesia. He helped build and install artificial coral reefs as part of a worldwide initiative to conserve and rejuvenate our environment. This combined his engineering knowledge with his passion for SCUBA diving. "I enjoyed the experience of traveling, making countless connections and friends, learning new skills, having fun, and helping others," Aden tells. "Throughout my time in Indonesia, I was able to travel and experience an entirely foreign culture while making new friends and connections from around the world."

Aden and Devy have fond memories of the many volunteer opportunities available throughout their time at Associated, which they took full advantage of. They participated in the Chanukah Food Bank initiative and the Passover Food Drive, and they even performed songs in seniors' residences as part of the AHS Choir. They also volunteered at camps in the summer, and on the weekends with their mother, AHS Art teacher Miriam Herlin. "Anything they could do, they did. They LOVED volunteering," Miriam shares. "They learned a lot of great values at Associated." Miriam is a Visual Arts Specialist who has been teaching art at Associated for 12 years. She also leads an art program at the Beth Emeth Bais Yehuda Synagogue for adults with special needs. An important childhood memory for Aden is when Miriam would bring him, his sister, and their grandmother to her special needs adult art programs on Sunday mornings. Aden would work with individual participants to help them complete the projects, while Devy would walk around the room offering support to anyone who needed it. "Volunteering has been a big part of my life for as long as I can remember," Aden says.

In 2020, Aden provided free online math tutoring to elementary school students, while Devy joined a peer mentoring program. They are both already planning their next volunteering-abroad experience. In a full-circle moment, Miriam is planning on going to Tanzania this summer with her daughter. "Once you do it, it gets in your blood," Miriam explains. "It's so important for us to get involved as a family."

Whether you want to volunteer close to home or on the other side of the world, Devy and Aden's advice is to "Find something that interests you. You'll learn new things and have fun" - while making a meaningful difference.


